Betty Schantz is excited about her new door stop on a dowel which helps her when leaving her apartment on her mobile cart. Bob Coble designed and built it after three

modifications. Many of the Maplewood apartment doors have a magnetic catch, but Betty's apartment does not have a wall where the magnet could be mounted. This door stop was pre-approved by PBC's Risk Management Committee.

The Woodworkers have been making items for sale for the last couple of years, but sales were



restricted just to the Maple Corner Gift Shop in Maplewood Estates. Covid shut down the campus and then in February 2022, the sprinkler system flood closed the Gift Shop. Therefore we were left in a quandary as to where to sell our wooden crafts.

It was then decided to sell items in the Thrift/Furniture Store, and with the outside traffic and word of mouth, sales have been steady and profitable.

We started selling items in the Thrift/Furniture Store on February 24, 2022, with only two sales that month, but since then 43 items have

been sold, totaling \$1100, of which 20% will go to the Auxiliary. These funds are used by the Woodworkers to purchase supplies, new tools, wood and general maintenance of equipment.

The most popular items are the oven squirrels, cutting boards, and segmented bowls. Children's toys, including puzzles, trucks, and trains are to be offered soon. As you can see from the picture, we have an assortment of stools, cutting boards, mortar and pestles, bowls, pens, and much more. All of these items make wonderful gifts for weddings, anniversaries, birthdays and retirements. Come out and support the Woodworkers and the Auxiliary.
