#### Refurbished Home for Wrens




Dave Wolff holds a birdhouse which needs its roof replaced. The wrens have made this house their home for two years, and Dave is hoping they will show up again this spring. He


#### The Furniture Team

## Charcuterie Board Jig

Working with live edge slabs can produce showcase projects. But without a very large planer and jointer, flattening and smoothing a rough slab can be a challenge. Joe Bondi and Roy Feiss are making a benchtop flattening jig out of plywood. The precision guide rails and the smooth sliding carriage will guide the router over the entirety of the surface, resulting in a flat and smooth top on our charcuterie boards.

Willow Grove Park was an amusement park located in Willow Grove, PA, that operated for eighty years from 1896 until 1975. The park sat vacant until the land was cleared for a large shopping mall known as Willow Grove Park Mall. The Park was one of the premier amusement parks in the USA for quite a long time. Many of our residents have fond memories of the time they spent at the Park.

Pictured above are Susan Elverson and Rick Layer sitting on one of two restored benches from the former Willow Grove Park. They were donated by Pondview residents Bob and Loretta Gamble. Jeff Miles, Director of Mission Support, had the cast iron ends sand blasted and Rick Layer painted them black.
